The award was presented to members of the Heritage Subcommittee of the Humber Watershed Alliance – a volunteer group comprised of dedicated citizens, representatives from the Toronto Region Conservation Authority, and the provincial Ministry of Tourism and Culture. Heritage Caledon, the Town’s municipal heritage committee, supported the nomination, due, in part, to the fact that Caledon is in the unique position of having the greatest number of designated bridge structures within the Humber River watershed: two steel truss bridges and two stone railway culverts.
